How did the Cariboo Gold Rush have an impact on the development of BC?

Thousands of people immigrated to Canada and the USA with the hope of finding a better life. At this time, this optimism was fueled by the **gold rushes** in North America. One of these gold rushes was directly responsible for the early development of British Columbia...

The California Gold Rush 1848 (p.213)

The Fraser River Gold Rush (in BC) (p.214)

In late 1857, an HBC trader arrived at Fort Victoria on Vancouver Island carry gold dust and nuggets that he had panned along the banks of the Thompson River. He presented what he had found to Governor Douglas. Douglas was aware of what happened in California and feared that news of gold in the colony of Vancouver Island might spark thousands of people flocking to the area in search of gold. His fears came true in the winter of 1857-1858 when prospectors in Washington and Oregon began moving north to the banks of the Fraser and Thompson Rivers...
